I support family involvement for all students – and all families at Corvallis High School. The main purpose of this column is to help parents of adolescents stop wondering if their involvement in their adolescent's education makes a difference. YES - parents involvement in all levels of a child's education make a very positive difference.

Parents and educators frequently end up like ships that pass in the night: overworked and time-deprived families and professionals can find it difficult to stop and exchange signals. This is true especially during high school years, due in part to adolescents' increasing desire for independence. As a result, family involvement in secondary schools tends to decrease from earlier years. Yet a large body of research supports the importance of family involvement in all levels of a students' education. A powerful predictor of adolescent's academic achievement and other positive outcomes are related to family involvement. Family involvement in secondary education is directly associated with higher rates of college enrollment.

Family involvement matters for students from all backgrounds, regardless of race, ethnicity, or income level. Families **want** to be involved and find creative ways to partner with schools.

To be successful in high school, adolescents need trusting and caring relationships with supportive adults. They also need opportunities to form their own identities, express themselves, and engage in experiences that develop competence and self-esteem. Although adolescents desire independence and time with peers, they continue to rely on guidance from parents and other adults (*Zarrett and Eccles, 2006*).

Home-school relationships – the formal and informal connections between the family and school are just as important for adolescents as with younger children. Such relationships provide parents with information they need to support their children's learning and success. Home-school relationships may include many types of interactions (e.g. parent-teacher conferences, parent-student-teacher conferences, counselor-parent and student conferences, phone calls, notes and email). Positive home-school relationships are associated with multiple benefits for adolescents. Remember, family involvement approaches must be respectful of an adolescents' drive for independence, expanding cognitive abilities and widening social networks.

By continually building and supporting family involvement throughout the high school years, families and schools can better ensure that students are ready to learn every school day and ready to exit high school prepared to enter university, college, trade schools, apprentice programs, the workforce and their professional and civic lives.

Cars are parking in the fire lane to pick up their students and there have been several near misses as cars try to maneuver out of line and into the drive way. AP Exams and ACT

Any school age child who does not have access to dental care or who does not have dental insurance and meets the income requirements is eligible for the free dental services. Once a child has been screened and approved, the child will be required to become a BGCC member. Yearly membership fee is \$25 and scholarships are available. Attendance

CHS needs your help in reporting absences. If your child has been or will be absent, please call the CHS Attendance Office at 757-5888 as soon as possible. **If you do not call**, the computer will record your child's absence as unexcused. After 48 hours, absences cannot be excused. Notes are not accepted in place of a phone call.

Absences may be excused at the request of a student's parent/guardian because of illness, disability, illness in the immediate family requiring the student's presence, a family emergency, religious reasons or anything the school deems appropriate (up to 5 pre-arranged absences per semester). Students who are eighteen years old may request their own absences be excused.

Do you still get a phone call from the "Automated" call system? - even AFTER you have called the Attendance line to excuse your student? Please be aware that when you have called to excuse your student from being absent for a certain period class, your student still may have missed another class the same day, in which the Automated phone system will dial out for the class that is left unexcused.

Please make arrangements with your student(s) prior to school hours about doctor and orthodontic appointments, as well as any other medical or non-medical appointments. Unless there is an emergency - all notes will be posted on student lockers as we try to avoid "reminder" notes to students. It disrupts class time.

An "Attendance Record" is posted outside of the Attendance Office. This record shows the student's attendance for the previous day and current day. If you receive an "Automated" telephone call stating that your student has missed one or more classes, please have your student check the attendance record to see which teacher marked them absent. If this was an error the student and teacher can resolve it. I look forward to another great year! Thank you for your cooperation.

New: *Three Cups of Tea: One Man’s Mission to Fight Terrorism and Build Nations—One School at a Time*

by Greg Mortenson and David Oliver Relin

This engrossing book will win the hearts of both high school students and their parents. In 1993 American Greg Mortenson undertook the climb of K2, the world’s second-tallest peak, in honor of his sister Christa, who had died at age 23 of epilepsy. When he became dangerously ill after a failed attempt, he was nursed back to health by the population of a remote mountain village in Pakistan. Out of gratitude, he vowed to build a school for the town. This book chronicles the dangerous and difficult building of not only that school, but 54 more in Taliban territory, some for girls. This is an inspirational story, about which Tom Brokaw says, “It’s proof that one ordinary person, with the right combination of character and determination, really can change the world.”
