Advisor Program

Every student is assigned an adult advisor for their four years at Crescent Valley. Students are randomly placed in Advisor groups. Each group consists of an adult advisor and 19-25 students in the same grade. Advisor meets twice each week for approximately 20 minutes. Attendance in Advisor is required.

The Crescent Valley High School Advisor program provides support to students and is the principal means by which students earn their career development credit for high school graduation.

Curriculum in the Advisor program will focus on three content areas: Career Education; Academic Achievement; and Social-Emotional Growth. Students and parents can track progress in Advisor using the Pinnacle grading system.

Students earn .125 credit per year for attending Advisor and completing all of the Career Related Learning Experiences (CRLEs) required in Advisor and related classes.

Career Related Learning Experiences

- *Tenth graders* are required complete the Career Shadow activity which provides them the opportunity to shadow a career they are interested in learning more about. As part of that process, students must revise their resume from 9th grade.
- *Eleventh graders* are required to attend a Mock Interview event in the spring that brings them together with members of the community to practice this vital job skill. As a part of that process, students must revise their resume from 10th grade.
- *Twelfth graders* must complete their Extended Application project in order to earn credit for Advisor and meet graduation requirements.

Home Game Friday Night – OSAA Policies Regarding Fan Behavior

Remind students that we have a football game this Friday. Discuss appropriate conduct for fan behavior (outlined below).

Dance Friday Night After the Football Game

Remind students we have our first school dance Friday night following the football game. Discuss appropriate conduct for school dances (outlined below).

Appropriate School Dance Conduct (Please read and discuss with your Advisor group)

Quick Reminders

1. ASB cards are required for admission to any school dance
2. Students are expected to dress and behave in accordance with district policy and school guidelines/expectations. (No moshing, lifting students overhead, etc.)
3. Students wishing to bring non-CVHS students as guests must complete a form available in the front office and receive administrative approval.
4. After a student arrives at the dance, he or she is not allowed to leave and then return.
5. School dances are tobacco, alcohol, and drug-free environments. Students who violate this policy at a dance shall be suspended or expelled and referred to the appropriate law enforcement agency. Students are reminded that school personnel have access to and will use a breathalyzer to determine if some has been drinking.

Big Reminder – CV Does Not Tolerate Obscene Dancing!

Obscene dancing which simulates sex and looks to outside observers like people having sex, standing up, with their clothes on is not permitted at school dances.

This dancing qualifies as lewd behavior. Lewd and unruly behavior, profane language and disrespect for authority will not be tolerated at school dances and will result in disciplinary action and loss of dance privileges. In many cases, obscene dancing can be considered sexual harassment.

Sexual Harassment Policy

According to district policy (Code JBA/GBN), sexual harassment is prohibited and will not be tolerated in the district.

Sexual harassment is unwelcome conduct of sexual nature and can include unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favors, and other verbal, nonverbal or physical conduct of sexual nature.

You may enjoy obscenely dancing with your partner, but there are many dance attendees who are not thrilled to be near you and your explicit movements.

Dances are a place to have fun and socialize; however, we have to stay within district guidelines because they are school-sponsored events.

Don't make your first dance at CV your last...keep it appropriate on Friday night.

Behavior at Sporting Events (Please read and discuss with your Advisor group)

CVHS sports teams rely on the amazing fan support of our student body. CV fans have to be sure that their support of the Raiders follows sportsmanship guidelines set out by the Oregon Schools Activities Association (OSAA) and the Mid-Willamette Conference.

- Spectators are not permitted to have signs or banners. This includes but is not limited to hand-held signs, t-shirts, and any other article of clothing.
- Spectators are not permitted to have noisemakers or items that enhance sound (for example, megaphones, cowbells, clappers, or air horns)
- Spectators are not permitted to use vulgar or offensive language
- Spectators are required to wear shirts at sporting events
- Spectators are not allowed on the playing floor, field, court, and/or track. Home schools can have spectators on the playing field for traditional introductions (like a tunnel for the football team).

Spectators who fail to comply with these OSAA standards shall be expelled from the game.

So what can you do at sporting events that is within the rules?

How can you show your Raider pride and cheer on your favorite players?

- Learn some of the standard spectator chants (like Raider, Raider, Raider and We are CV), create some of your own POSITIVE and APPROPRIATE cheers, and join in when the crowd wants to make some noise.
- As a Raider fan you are cheering FOR Crescent Valley not AGAINST the other team or officials. Direct your energy toward CV and use your voice to cheer on the Raiders.
- Show pride in your school by showing respect to players and fans of opposing teams as well as officials.
- Paint your face or wear your school colors with pride.
- Fans who come dressed up to games are AWESOME. Just remember to keep your shirts on.
- Find the student section at the football field and in the gym. Stand up...cheer loudly and be a part of Raider Nation. Just stay in the stands.

Remember – Good sports show school spirit by supporting the efforts of their team – not by trying to upstage the team with outrageous behavior or calling attention to themselves.
