Message from Cherie Stroud, Principal

Welcome to our incoming families for the 2007-08 school year! We are excited to have you join our school and want to make your transition to our community a smooth one. Our eighth grade Open House is scheduled for Wednesday, April 18, from 6:45-9:30pm. Families will be greeted in the gym for an introduction to the evening, and to experience the spirit of our pep band, cheerleaders and dance team. A school tour and career fair will follow. We are very proud of our school and its programs, and are eager to share them with our new families.

To better transition freshmen into Crescent Valley, we have two new programs beginning next year. Link Crew is a high school mentoring program in which junior and senior students "link" with groups of about ten freshmen. On September 4, an orientation will welcome all incoming freshmen. On this day, new students will meet their Link Leader and embark on a day of celebration, teambuilding and relationship building. Of course, students will also become familiar with the school campus and learn about our school programs and activities.

Another new opportunity available to freshmen next year is a course called Freshmen Focus. This elective social studies course is designed to ease the transition into high school as well as build a foundation of skills that can be used throughout a student's four years at Crescent Valley. The class will provide students the opportunity to work on personal development, educational achievement and career/life skills, leading to greater success both during and beyond the high school years.

Spring registration begins immediately following spring break. We will hold extended advisor periods in order to facilitate the registration process. On April 4 and 5, class meetings will be held to inform students about course offerings for next year. Students will begin completing the registration forms at this time and finish them on Monday, April 9. This is the time you, as parents, should become part of the registration process. The course description handbook and registration form will come home with your student during this week. Please become an active participant in your child's decisions regarding course selections. Staffing and scheduling decisions are based on spring registration; therefore, it is very important that course requests be carefully considered and registration forms thoughtfully completed. Our CV counselors will be visiting the middle schools during the week of April 16 to begin the registration process for eighth grade students. Please call the counseling department at 757-5815 if you have questions.

We hope to see you at spring conferences, which will be held in the CV cafeteria on April 12 and 13. This is a won-

derful time to connect with teachers about your child's educational progress. Please see the conference schedule included in this newsletter.

April is a busy time with preparation for the next school year. Two major processes begin: staffing and budget preparation. By the end of April, we should know our staffing needs for next year. Because of the new teaching positions afforded by local option levy coupled with vacated positions, we will be hiring several new teachers next year. Along with staffing decisions, an initial budget will be proposed for next year. Specifics about the budget will be shared with staff at the April 4 staff meeting and with parents at the Parent Coffee on April 5. Important considerations in preparing the budget will include reducing class size in the key content areas—math, science, social studies and English – as well as providing the necessary funding to support program needs.

We are very proud of the many accomplishments of our students both in and out of the classroom. Congratulations are in order to the following students:

- CV science students who participated at the Central Western Oregon Science Exposition held at Western Oregon University in Monmouth in February. Fifty-eight CV students participated with several winning high honors for their projects. Please see the specifics about the winners and their awards in the separate article in this newsletter. Thank you to both the students for their hard work, and to teachers Adam Kirsch and Dave Beran for their dedication and commitment to student learning.

- Winter sports athletes had an amazing season both academically and athletically! Academic honors were awarded to boys' basketball, girls' swimming, and wrestling teams for their first place finishes for highest GPA in the state! Top ten finishes were received by both girls' basketball and boys' swimming as well. All winter teams, including cheerleading, have combined GPAs over 3.0. Both the girls' and boys' swim teams took first place in the Mid-Willamette Conference league as well as first in the state this year. Our girls' basketball team took first place in the league and fifth in the state. What an accomplishment!

- Crescent Valley's performing arts programs—band, choir and orchestra, as well as the dance team—are competing in both district and state competitions this spring. We know they will do an excellent job as well!

As you can see, we have much to be proud of at Crescent Valley. We have exceptionally talented students, a professional staff dedicated to student learning and devoted, supportive parents. Please join me in celebrating the success and commitment to excellence evident in our community.

Student Standouts

Congratulations to all CV science students who participated at the Central Western Oregon Science Exposition held at Western Oregon University in Monmouth on February 23-24. Twenty-two student groups and 58 CV students participated. Several CV students won high honors for their projects:

- **Elton Chen** (GPS Based Phase-Shift Robotic Total Station Target Tracking System) was recognized by the US Navy for one of three top engineering and physics related studies and was invited to move on to the state competition in Portland in March.
- **Nicole Bateham, Sydney Boyce,** and **Sunithi Hindagolla** (The Effects of Wave Period, Water Depth and Beach Slope on Coastal Erosion) were selected to move on to the state competition in Portland in March.
- **Kenzie Hruby** (Bactericidal Effect of Sodium Hypochlorite: Food Safety Adjuvant) was selected by her peers (including students from other schools) as the best overall project. She was awarded a \$10,000 scholarship at OSU, and will move on to the state competition in Portland in March.
- **Raymond Ehlers, Curtis Peterson,** and **Sean Skylingstad** (Reformation of Landfill Gas for Power Production with a Fuel Cell Using Activated Charcoal) were recognized with an award for the most creative use of materials, and were recognized as the best group at the expo, winning an all-expense-paid trip to Albuquerque, New Mexico, for a week in May to compete at the International Intel Science and Engineering Expo.

Again, congratulations to everyone who participated. Seventy-five students participated in this year's American Mathematics Contest. Of those, the following students received top honors: **Seungyeon (Jessica) Sa**, highest score on the AMC 10; **Yichen Wu**, highest score on the AMC 12; **Jason Kang** and **Eric Teegarden**, both with the second highest score on the AMC 12; and **Dylan Lee** for the third highest score on the AMC 12. Yichen, Jason, Eric, and Dylan were invited to participate in the American Invitational Mathematics Exam on March 13. Congratulations to all of these students!

The math department will soon offer another opportunity to take part in a regional math competition. High scores can lead to scholarships and participation in the statewide contest. Students can watch for details in the daily bulletin.

Speech and Debate Team to National Championships!

A team of high school students from the Corvallis Speech and Debate Team traveled to Ashland for the Southern District National Championship Qualifier, with outstanding results. Qualifying for the National Championships was CV's **Alyssa Vincent-Hill** in the Lincoln-Douglas Value Debate. Alyssa will represent Corvallis at the Nationals in Wichita, Kansas in June, competing against the best high school debaters in the nation. The team is coached by Danielle Robertson, Forensics Director for the Corvallis School District.

The Speech and Debate Team is currently fundraising to
