Message from Cherie Stroud, Principal

Spring is in the air as we head into the final months of this school year. As the days become longer, we are reminded that summer is just around the corner. The remaining days of the school year are sure to be full of activity as students complete current course requirements and forecast for next year's classes. Our staff is busy making the final touches on course revisions/additions for the course description handbook to prepare for spring registration.

Spring registration will occur during the first two weeks of April. Through the advisor program, students will receive a registration form and course description handbook, as well as specific course information. As students consider courses for next year, they will bring the registration information home for parent input. The registration form requires a parent signature before it is returned to school for processing; look for this form during the week of April 9. It is important that parents take time to talk with their student about his/her choices for next year. Students must sign up for, or "forecast," all courses they wish to take next year, as we plan teacher assignments and the master schedule on the information received during spring forecasting. If necessary, please call the school for more information.

I am pleased to announce several new staff members to our Crescent Valley community. **Patti Pauk** began the second semester at CV as the 9th grade study hall supervisor. This is a difficult job and she does it well each day, with a smile on her face! **Annika Mauelshagen** has taken over counseling duties for **Kendra Brott**, who remains on maternity leave. **Diana Mortlock** expertly filled this position during the first semester. **Maureen Weidenkopf** joins us half time as a special education teacher. We appreciate her placement at CV to reduce caseloads for our special education department. **Emily Musch** is back at CV teaching English classes for **Julie Halsey**, who is also on maternity leave. Finally, retired teacher **Bill Goslow** returns to the hallways of CV, teaching one section of government.

Additional district allocations for this semester allowed us to hire two of the positions mentioned above: the study hall supervisor and an additional section of government to reduce large class sizes in this area. In addition, we added one hour of classified staff time in our learning lab, allowing us to serve more students in this alternative environment. Also, we currently have an opening for a campus support supervisor to assist in monitoring our campus during the day.

After spring registration and district staffing is completed in April and early May, we will open the teaching positions afforded by the passing of the local option levy. This will amount to five full-time teaching positions in English, math, science, social science and vocational technical education.

Thank you to all of you who supported this worthwhile financial resource to our schools; lower class sizes will definitely make a positive difference in educating our students.

I am constantly amazed at how much our parents give to our school. They make valuable contributions of time, energy and support. They fill requests from teacher wish lists and supply our school with Kleenex! And, sometimes, they pool resources together to purchase equipment for our school. This year, in addition to many personal donations, several HP families contributed to supply substantial equipment purchases for CV. A separate article details these contributions, and I want to extend enormous appreciation for the contributions from all our families. No wonder we have such amazing students!

On a final note, congratulations to our CV swim team; both the girls' and boys' teams are 5A state champions! It is certainly rare, if not unheard of, for both genders to earn a state title in the same sport, in the same season. This provides one more example of how our CV students excel.

National Merit Finalists

Congratulations to Courtney Gardner, selected as the Kiwanis Student of the second quarter and to **Rachel Lee,** selected as the Future First Citizen by the Corvallis Chamber Coalition.

Boys & Girls Club Corvallis Youth of the Year

CV senior, **Sean Flanagan,** the son of Stephen and Catherine Flanagan, won honors as the Boys & Girls Club of Corvallis Youth of the Year and will advance to statewide competition. Sean, who has been a member of the Boys & Girls Club since 2005, edged out three other finalists for the honor.

Nearly 200 people gathered for the club's annual Youth of the Year luncheon, which doubled as the club's yearly tribute to Corvallis service organizations. The luncheon drew participants from 11 Corvallis service clubs who heard the four finalists present short speeches. They had submitted essays and other materials earlier. Sean started his remarks by admitting, "I am not much a fan of public speaking," but went on to talk about how his activities with the Boys & Girls Club had built his confidence and leadership skills. At the club, he has participated in activities such as chaperoning middle school dances, volunteering with the club's annual Hoop Jam, and helping to organize teen nights. "I think it was just the way I could help out," he said, and added that he particularly enjoys "being a good example to younger kids." Helping people figures into his career plans as well: He wants to be a firefighter.

Other finalists were **Neil Browning,** a senior at CV; **Melissa Leon,** a sophomore at CHS; and **Drew Wolf,** a freshman at CV. Sean received a plaque, presented by Corvallis Mayor Charlie Tomlinson. Sean will move on to statewide competition in Salem to name the Oregon Boys & Girls Club Youth of the Year. The Oregon winner advances to regional competition and a possible chance to compete for a national title.

CV Student Athlete Recognized for Years of Excellence

Special honor goes to Senior Champion Athlete **Jamie Winter** for her devotion to excellence as coach of the Oregon Elite Youth Cheerleading Team and as a competitor on the Senior Cheerleading Team. In December, Jamie's team won a national championship at the Oregon Convention Center and also took class champion. In January, all Oregon Elite competition teams took first place at the Northwest Cheer Challenge and the junior and senior teams tied for Grand Champion. When asked to comment about Jamie, Coach/Owner, Suzi Stavas had this to say, "Jamie brings an incomparable amount of energy to the team she coaches, as well as, to the team she cheers. She is incredibly talented in the sport of cheerleading, but she is also a great person who gives her younger peers someone to look up to."

Jamie Winter has uninterruptedly cheered for either public

school or private gym teams since fifth grade. At age 10, her tiny, petite stature and athletic confidence started her as a flyer. In eighth grade, Jamie was one of the youngest cheerleading athletes to qualify for the honor of receiving the emblem from the American Cheerleading Athletic Association (ACAA), with the option to purchase the ACAA letterman's jacket. She was still so petite, the extra small size jacket buried her. Jamie became a varsity letterman in cheerleading during her freshman year at CV.

Crescent Valley Teams Win Academic Awards

The Oregon School Activities Association (OSAA) and the Oregon Dairy Farmers sponsor the Academic All-State program each sport season. This winter season, CV wrestling won first place with a 3.55 GPA team average, girls' swimming was first place with a 3.78 GPA, dance team was first with a 3.66 GPA, and boys' basketball was tied for first place with 3.61 GPA for all 5A schools. In addition, coming in seventh were girls' basketball with a 3.62 GPA and boys' swimming with a 3.41 GPA. Congratulations to these teams!

The girls' basketball team is the league champion for the Mid-Willamette Conference. State tournament play off games began on March 3.

Overdue CC Materials?

Please check around your house, car and locker for CC books/college catalogues/SAT study materials/etc. that have been checked out for more than two weeks. Please return them as soon as possible, so that others can have access to the materials too.

Important - AP Registration

Students or parents may register for Advanced Placement (AP) exams in the Career Center until March 16. To register, complete a registration form (in the CC) and attach a non-refundable deposit of \$15 per exam (cash or check payable to "CVHS"). We DO NOT want total payment until the end of April, since many students decide not to take an exam after it has been ordered, resulting in extra cost to issue a refund check.

The total cost of each AP exam is \$93 and the balance of \$78 per exam will be due in the Career Center April 16 - April 27. Students who register after the March deadline will incur a late fee.

\$15.00 non-refundable deposit per exam (due at registration Feb. 15 – March 16)

\$78.00 (due April 16 – 27)

New book: *The Astonishing Life of Octavian Nothing, Traitor to the Nation, volume 1: the Pox Party*

Despite the long and mysterious title, and the drab cover of this new novel, M.T. Anderson's new book has won the Booklist 2006 Top of the List award for young adults. Reading it explains why. Employing elegant, archaic language and alternating voice, along with visuals substituting for words, the author vividly describes the issues of racism, slavery, free will, and the causes of the American Revolution through the eyes of a black youth. Octavian is given a classical education in his household of radical philosophers, but you will

have to read this excellent novel to find out what happens to him when he runs away and joins the Patriots' cause. This is a powerful novel that should not be missed.
